### Our Work to Date

Our projects vary from reforestation to wildlife habitat restoration to enhancing the utilization of wood fibre.

#### **Pressy Lake Rehabilitation Project:**

We have removed burned, dead standing trees from Pressy Lake where the 2017 Elephant Hill Wildfire. We ground and chipped the low value fibre to transport it to secondary manufacturers and tree planters have been replanting the area through funding provided by Natural Resources Canada's 2 Billion Trees program.

#### **Enhanced Fibre Utilization:**

We utilize dead or fire damaged wood fibre to create electricity in partnership with the Forest Enhancement Society of BC, Drax, Cariboo Pulp, and Atlantic Power. Close to 1 million cubic metres of fibre have been recovered to address fibre shortages for local pellet and biomass production facilities.

#### **Douglas Fir Rehabilitation:**

We have rehabilitated 9,000+ hectares of burned Douglas Fir and Pine stands, and have planted over 7 million seedlings over three years.

#### **Wildfire Hazard Mitigation:**


We are continuously working to reduce wildfire risk in the area, through funding from Forest Enhancement Society of BC. So far, we have treated over 10,000 hectares to mitigate wildfire risk to our forests and communities.



## Collaboration

Our partnerships continue to drive meaningful change on the land. With support from Natural Resources Canada's Build and Mobilize Foundational Wildland Fire Knowledge Program and the Forest Enhancement Society of BC, CCR is leading the Palmer Project—an initiative that reduces wildfire risk by thinning dense natural regeneration, recovering burned wood fibre, and creating healthier, more resilient forests. By working with government, industry, and Indigenous partners, CCR is not only improving forest health but also generating economic opportunities and long-term environmental benefits for communities across the Cariboo Chilcotin. Together, these partnerships enable CCR to make substantial strides in addressing complex challenges and fostering sustainable development.
